



Archdiocese of Seattle Settles Three Historical Cases

SEATTLE, July 10, 2024 – Today the Archdiocese of Seattle announced final settlements totaling approximately \$1.4 million for three separate claims related to allegations of sexual abuse. Each of these cases involve individuals who are deceased. The Archdiocese of Seattle settled:

- A case involving allegations of sexual abuse by Father William Quick and Father Lawrence Low in approximately 1964 or 1965 when Quick served as Pastor and Low served as an assistant at St. Francis Parish in Seahurst. Quick and Low are both deceased.
- A case involving an allegation of sexual abuse by Father John Cornelius from approximately 1987 to 1998. Cornelius served as the Pastor of Immaculate Conception Parish in Seattle from 1978 to 1996 and Parochial Vicar at Immaculate Conception and Our Lady of Perpetual Help Parishes in Everett from 1997 to 2002. Cornelius is deceased.
- A case involving an allegation of sexual abuse by Terry McGrath in approximately 1982. McGrath served as a CYO basketball coach at St. John the Evangelist in Seattle during that timeframe. McGrath is deceased.

Commitment to transparency

Quick, Low and Cornelius were all included on the archdiocese's [List of Clergy and Religious Brothers and Sisters for Whom Allegations of Sexual Abuse of a Minor Have Been Admitted, Establish or Determined to be Credible](#) when the list was originally published in January 2016.

This list was first published in 2016 with review from former FBI-agent Dr. Kathleen McChesney and her firm, Kinsale Management Consulting. The names of those identified in this review were then provided to the external Archdiocesan Review Board and to Archbishop J. Peter Sartain who approved the publication of the names in 2016.

Since then, the Archdiocese of Seattle has added names to the list and updated it with links to other public lists provided by religious orders that worked in the archdiocese as well as status updates related to people currently on the list.

Focused on Prevention

As part of its commitment to transparency, the Archdiocese of Seattle invites people to visit its [Protect and Heal website](#) to learn about the history of sexual abuse in the archdiocese, which peaked in 1975 and has since sharply declined. The website also outlines the focus on helping victim survivors and their families find healing, and how since the early 1980s the archdiocese has taken steps to prevent abuse and protect the community.

Today the archdiocese enforces its [Safe Environment Program](#) with policies and procedures designed to prevent and recognize signs of sexual abuse of minors.
